

SUMMARY

1140	First Castle near the Church built by Sir Bertram de Bulmer, Sheriff of Yorkshire.
1382	Present Plantaganet Castle built by Ralph Neville, first Earl of Westmorland.
1450-71	Richard Neville, Warwick the Kingmaker, uses the Castle as a power-base during the Wars of the Roses.
1471	The Castle is given by Edward IV to his brother Richard, Duke of Gloucester (later Richard III) as a reward for his loyalty, after the disloyal Warwick's death at the Battle of Barnet. Richard is created Lord of the North with Sheriff Hutton as a base.
1483	Were the Princes in the Tower conveyed here and later killed by Henry VII? Earl Rivers, in prison here, writes his will.
1484	Richard III establishes Sheriff Hutton as a residence of his new Council of the North (and so it remains for over a century). Edward, Prince of Wales, dies and is buried at Sheriff Hutton.
1485	Castle used as a sanctuary by Richard III's relatives at the time of the Battle of Bosworth: Princess Elizabeth of York, Edward, Earl of Warwick, and others. After the battle the victorious Henry Tudor conveys Elizabeth to London. She becomes Queen and, later, mother of Henry VIII.
1489	Thomas Howard, Earl of Surrey, appointed to the Council and lives here along with the nominal Lieutenant, Henry VIII's infant son, Prince Arthur.
1513	Howard returns to Sheriff Hutton to rest after the Battle of Flodden Field; his dukedom of Norfolk is restored.
1522	Poet Laureate, John Skelton, writes his poem 'A Crown of Laurel' at Sheriff Hutton.
1525	Henry Fitzroy, Duke of Richmond, becomes titular Lieutenant-General of the North, residing here.
1536	Thomas Howard, the younger, 3rd Duke of Norfolk, appointed to the Council, takes up residence here to quell uprisings against Henry VIII.
1573	Earl of Huntingdon attempts to repair Castle which has fallen into a state of deterioration.
1618	Castle has become a ruin and is assigned by James I to Thomas Lumsden, 'Gentleman of the Privy Chamber'.
1621	The Ingram family start to take control and to dismantle the Castle to build Sheriff Hutton Hall.
1666	Manor and Castle of Sheriff Hutton granted by Charles II to the Ingram family, with whom it remained until 1919.

Mr B G Jagger buys the Castle for £100 from the family of Lord Halifax (lineal descendants of the Ingrams).

1940 Mr Wilfred Wagstaff (in whose family it remains) buys Castle Farm (including the Castle) from Mr Jagger.
